Ottawa, ON – March 31, 2025 The Canada FASD Research Network (CanFASD) is proud to announce Kathy Unsworth will be moving into a new role as the Executive Director, effective April 1, 2025.

Unsworth will be replacing Audrey McFarlane, who is scaling back her leadership responsibilities after eight years as Executive Director. McFarlane will remain with the organization, transitioning into a new role as the Director of Strategic Partnerships and Initiatives.

Kathy Unsworth has served as Managing Director at CanFASD since 2013. She has been instrumental in driving forward national initiatives, including advocacy for Bill S-253, the proposed National FASD Framework. Unsworth's expertise in public health, community development, and evidence-based policy will be critical as CanFASD continues its mission to ensure that people with FASD receive the support they deserve.

"I am deeply honored to take on the role of Executive Director," **said Unsworth.** "This is a pivotal moment for FASD in Canada. With over 1.5 million Canadians with FASD, there is an urgent need for a coordinated, evidence-based approach to support individuals and families. Together with our Board of Directors and our dedicated team, I am committed to advancing CanFASD's research, advocacy, and resources to improve the lives of those impacted by FASD."
